1st Reading – Book of Wisdom

One of the many Dutch expressions that my parents often quoted, (translated) was only five words; “*A house is a cross.*” The reason why the Dutch say this line is because once you have a home, you are always fixing, repairing or maintaining the structure in one form or another. The Dutch also have another expression that is equally pessimistic that goes; “*When you have your home perfect, you will die!*” (I know, kind of bleak!)

I mention housing, as I am still working on getting settled in the rectory. On Tuesday, as I was painting the ceiling in the foyer, a couple of good souls from the parish stopped to bring me some garden items. They reminded me that I was in keeping with my story in my Sunday homily. For just as Michelangelo was painting the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel, so now, during the week, I was painting ceilings as well.

The administrative end of the parish has not allowed me to give my undivided attention to my residence. Yet, this week, I had two, full 12 hour days to finally move into my bedroom closets and to plaster and paint two ceilings, and to finish some of the cleaning after the plumber’s visit. My Mother has so often said that she was grateful that she had the ability to do the work that she did around the house. I certainly feel the same way and enjoy working quietly on some physical projects.

Many of the saints believed that physical work can be a source of spiritual inspiration, from washing a floor to painting a ceiling. St. Therese, Blessed Mother Theresa and St. Benedict, to name a few, saw work as a form of spiritual enrichment. It was St. Benedict, who coined the phrase, “*Ora et Labora*”, “*Work and Prayer*”.

So, as I was painting a ceiling, it dawned on me that this old rectory, like most residences remind us that left alone, things are slowly rusting, decaying and crumbling. All things are returning back to the original source of the ground from which they came. As houses, so too this body of ours that houses our souls.

Twenty-five years ago I could stand on a ladder painting the side of a barn, and it phased me very little. Today, I wake up stiff and slightly sore (a good feeling) but with the realization, I am not getting any younger.

We are blessed liturgically, that this weekend we are able to celebrate the Feast of All Souls on Sunday. The entire month of November is spiritually reserved for us to pray for our dearly departed that they might be freed of their spiritual chains in purgatory and be welcomed into the eternal Kingdom.

As the trees have lost their leaves and natural reality is revealing that another cold winter is almost

upon us; so too, as we age and mature, we also are naturally aware that the cold sleep of death is waiting for us, maybe sooner than we think. It is easy to say that when we die we will all go straight to heaven. But that is personal belief but not the Church’s teachings. For every Sunday we say in the Creed that “Christ will come to judge both the living and the dead”. There is no need for divine judgment if eternity is presumed, simply for living on the earth.

My staff informed me that we are running low in Mass intentions in the parish. I have never experienced this before as there was always a high demand for Mass intentions to pray for our beloved dead. Maybe, consider stopping by the office to have a Mass offered for your parents, spouse or loved one that has gone before you during this month of November. The Church teaches that if our loved one who has passed is in full communion with the Lord, then those prayers will go to a poor soul that is in need of those prayers. Let us hold up in prayer this November all those who have died, that they might have a beautiful dwelling place in the Kingdom of Heaven! God love you!

STEWARDSHIP

We had another good collection this week that exceeded budget. Your stewardship has been wonderful. Over these four weeks, we have sufficient money to pay off \$10,000 per week on our subsidy for the Loyola School system. I want to keep up with the payments in proportion to where we are at in the calendar year. Right now we are still behind, but the Good News is that we are catching up.

Our Diocesan-wide “Diocesan Ministries Appeal”, is forthcoming in this month of November. The Bishop has set our goal for Holy Rosary at \$27,000. Last year the parish did not meet the goal and the remainder of the monies came from the General Funds of the parish. You have been so generous so far, in the first third of the year, I have confidence that if we all pull together, we can not only make the goal, but exceed the goal. Any monies that we go over will be split 50% for our Catholic School subsidy and the other 50% for the Diocesan Assessments.

Your generosity is tremendous. Thank you so very much!!!!

2014 DIOCESAN MINISTRIES APPEAL

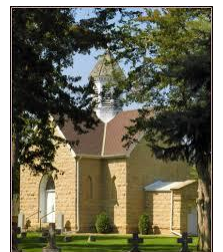
