

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

“While they were eating, He took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them and said, ‘Take it, this is my body.’ Then He took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, ‘This is the blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many.’”

- St. Mark

This weekend the Universal Church around the world celebrates Corpus Christi Sunday (or, in English, “The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ”). Around many parts of the world this is a huge feast that is celebrated in a big way, like one of the great days of Holy Week.



Unfortunately, we in America want everything quick from “fast-food” to “fast-faith-experiences”. (*It is a curiosity that, when a game goes into over-time, it is exciting, but when the liturgy goes over its allotted time, there is not nearly the same excitement.*) So, to initiate the practice or return to the practice of having a Corpus Christi procession might be a little too much Catholicism for most Catholics. However, I was most pleased with how our procession for Palm Sunday went and later heard many favorable comments. It went smoothly and certainly added solemnity to that most Holy of weeks, as we processed from the former-school gym to the main church.

Last year, while I was serving the “Light of the World” Area Faith Communities of Seaforth, Wanda, Wabasso and Lucan, the small Catholic community of St. Mathias in Wanda asked if I would be okay to continue their annual tradition of a Corpus Christi procession. I quickly agreed and the people were so happy.

So, after the Mass, we processed to the various shrines with the monstrance and a canopy on a beautiful summer evening. There were some young girls strewing rose petals in the grass as we walked and the majority of parishioners walked behind me in solemn procession. It had the making of a quaint and cozy Catholic devotion, had it not been for the hoard of mosquitoes that, “to our surprise”, also arrived on the scene. (They are part of God’s creation too!) Needless to say, I kept the prayers brief. No one complained, but appreciated that we “kept it moving”, at least that night.

No more should a Minnesotan be surprised to see mosquitoes in June, than for a Jew to talk about blood and the sacrifice of bodies, although be it animals. For the link of all three readings is the word “BLOOD”. To speak of blood is to speak equally of the “BODY”. For in the First Reading from the Book of Exodus we read Moses sprinkling blood of a bull on the people and praying; “*This is the blood*

of the covenant that the Lord has made with you in accordance with all these words of His.”

In the Second Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, we also hear about BLOOD and indirectly the BODY, but this time it is not about a bull, goat, or sheep, but rather about the Blessed One, the Son of God and Savior. For we read; “*...For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of heifer’s ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God.”*

The poetic sequence for Corpus Christi is optional, but we read poetically in there; “*...Blood is poured and flesh is broken, yet in either wondrous token Christ entire we know to be.”*

Finally, we come to the Gospel from St. Mark. We return again to that First Holy Thursday as the Last Supper and really the First Holy Eucharist was celebrated. After hundreds and even thousands of years of the concert of human history, it all crescendos with Christ’s New Covenant and the consecration of Himself on the Cross and daily around the world through bread and wine that becomes truly His Body and Blood.

In some respects, every Sunday and every day is Corpus Christi Sunday. Every time we enter a Catholic Church and genuflect, every time we enter the church to attend Mass and to give our whole selves in song and prayer, every time we acknowledge that we have missed Mass through our own fault in the confessional, the spirit of Corpus Christi, the spirit of Christ’s Body and Blood lives. Happy feast day!

STEWARDSHIP

Thank you for your gifts of stewardship in these first weeks of summer. We did not make the budgeted amount, but we are ahead of last year with our total income of more than \$300.00.

This week I reported to the Finance Council that when I took just a stewardship core sample of the last six weeks of giving, from the close of April and all of the month of May, overall giving has increased exponentially each week. In fact, there has not been a week in the last weeks or months that we have not exceeded the overall contribution of the previous year.

Just in the last six weeks (*which is post Easter and the collections naturally take a dip*), the overall weekly offerings were up by more than \$31,000.00 or more than \$5,200.00 per week. If we take the recent successful parish auction off the table, the weekly over-all increase is still at almost \$3,500.00 per week.

With this added stewardship we are now able to address some very basic maintenance concerns, from a new furnace to some basic fixing and repairs, a really good cleaning and polishing of the church, and some serious cleaning in the school. Because of your good stewardship we are able to proceed to clean and beautify our facility this summer. **THANK YOU FOR DOING SUCH A GREAT JOB IN THE AREA OF STEWARDSHIP THIS YEAR!!!!**

NEW DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

I am "extremely" pleased and excited to announce to you, the good people of Holy Rosary, that, as pastor, I have hired a new Director of Religious Education, Mrs. Cathy Neve. Cathy has been a life-time member of Holy Rosary, having



attended Holy Rosary School and graduating from Loyola.

Cathy has a B.A. from the College of St. Scholastica, Duluth, a Masters Degree in education from M.S.U. and a Specialist Degree in Educational Administration from M.S.U. as well. Cathy is also licensed in coaching, math, life science and K-12 principal. In short, Cathy possesses a very impressive resume in both education and education administration.

Cathy has been an educator in both the Catholic High School at Holy Trinity in Winsted (in the Diocese of New Ulm) as well as here in Mankato at East High School for more than two decades. She comes highly recommended.

One of her colleagues wrote of Cathy: *"I believe that Cathy would be an excellent candidate for this position...Cathy has a vested interest in education, both for herself and others. She has served as a cooperative teacher in her classroom; she continues to further her own education, earning advanced degrees; and attends and presents at educational conferences....Cathy has implemented many new teaching strategies in her classroom in an effort to further engage students in their learning...Because of her interest and understanding in technology, she is a member of the technology committee here at Mankato East HS...I give Cathy my highest recommendation."*

Cathy will officially begin working under contract starting on July 1st. However, Cathy has asked to come in earlier to volunteer and begin organizing and making preparations for the fall. She is also coming to our parish staff at her own personal stewardship sacrifice. These are also strong signs of her excitement and commitment to her Catholic faith and childhood parish, her students, catechists and the educational process.

On a personal note, Cathy and I go back to the late 1980's, when together we taught in the Catholic High School at Holy Trinity in Winsted. I was teaching religion classes to eight graders and tenth graders and Cathy was teaching in the science department. We both arrived as young teachers back then. We had lost touch with one another over the years as I headed out west to become pastor in three different assignments for the next 24 years. But we met up again at Holy Rosary when I arrived last June. God does write straight with crooked lines.

I am excited for the parish of Holy Rosary, for our young families and their children and the wonderful evangelization tool that our religious educational program will further bring in proclaiming the Good News of Christ to our ever-growing parish! Welcome Cathy! We are so happy that you said "Yes!"

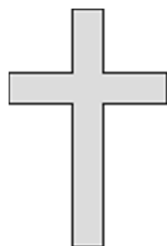

SUMMER REPAIRS

Recently, in consultation with the trustees, it was decided to complete the tuck-pointing work on the rectory by removing the mortar from the brick. In addition, it was strongly recommended that we would address the limestone that is the trim on our 1950's church. Limestone is a porous rock and takes on moisture readily when it is not sealed. When the windows were removed from the church with their wooden frames and replaced with steel framed windows and stained glass, it was noted that the wooden window frames had rotted and deteriorated. This is the result of the limestone taking on moisture and sending it into the wooden frames.

The limestone was cleaned with an acid and water wash and then has been sealed. The above picture gives you an idea of how bad a shape the stone was in. The limestone was allowing water into the church structure and that is why you see the discoloration on the interior stone. It is also why we were having moisture problems in the church in the recent years. Every five years or so this stone needs to be re-sealed.

The front entrance of the church looks incredibly clean and beautiful again. I hope you take a moment to look at it. We have a beautiful church, but it takes work to maintain it. One of the members of my Maintenance Committee from a previous assignment use to say; *"Anyone can build a building. It takes someone special to maintain it."*

CITY-WIDE YOUTH MINISTRY UPDATE

This past Wednesday, we had another meeting at St. John's to discuss a City-Wide Youth Ministry program. I have attended, as pastor, all of the meetings that have been held. With the absence of two of our pastors for a good portion of the start of 2015, it has been difficult to make decisions and to budget the necessary revenue for a program to begin in the fall of 2015.

However, at our last meeting, both St. John's and Holy Rosary are standing together in solidarity that we will initiate a program that will begin this fall with some start-up activities for our youth and perhaps special youth liturgies/spiritual activities as well. The committee will continue to meet, prepare and plan for a full-scale Youth Ministry Program for the fall of 2016.

**WORSHIP COMMITTEE MINUTES
HOLY ROSARY – MAY 4, 2015**

The Holy Rosary Worship Committee was called to order by Chairman, Cathy Neve, at 6:30 P.M. Full attendance of the membership was present. The meeting opened with prayer led by Father. The past minutes of the March 2nd meeting were read and approved.

Father began with his pastoral comments expressing great gratitude for all of their hard work during Lent and Holy Week. Everything went like a well-oiled machine. Father heard many favorable comments from the faithful. (The Worship Committee had also heard numerous positive comments.) Through the generosity of the people, the flower fund was able to continue the Easter decoration environment by putting out flowers throughout the season. Father had made use of the school cooler and the recycling of the many funeral flowers, sustaining them for two and sometimes even three weeks. Father thanked those who assisted him with the flower clean-up. Father also wanted to say how “proud” he was of the Worship Committee that has been re-activated and now has regular scheduled meetings. Father stated that the group is such a wonderful group of diverse people, all with different talents and gifts that make the work so joyful.

Father concluded that the committee will not be meeting during the months of summer. However, there is a great need to clean and sort through the sacristy closets and cupboards. Father and the chairman Cathy wanted to express thanks with a little celebration at the close of the meeting.

Holy Week and the Triduum was reviewed. Eucharistic Minister training and the installation of the members was discussed. Follow up will need to be done with those who have not been installed as this is a requirement of the Diocese and the Bishop to be installed at the liturgy.

The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed throughout the months of summer on First Fridays. The dates will be June 5th, July 3rd and August 7th. Worship committee members will call for volunteers to insure that there is always someone there before the Blessed Sacrament. These times of exposition will conclude at 3:00 P.M.

The altar cloths that had been purchased were discussed. These cloths still do not fit properly. Father will contact the company to see what can be done to rectify the situation.

The Food Shelf collections were discussed. There are very few items coming in on a monthly basis. It was discussed to do the collections less often and with greater encouragement. Perhaps during the month of November and equally during the Lenten season. No final decision was reached.

Time and Talent Surveys are being reviewed and will be tabulated. The results will be used in many ways in the year

ahead. It was decided that the Time and Talent surveys will not be done annually, but perhaps every other year.

New Business: The environment for Pentecost was discussed as well as a date to clean the storage areas in the sacristy. Dates for Communal anointing will be held both at the parish as well as at Pathstone in June where Father is assigned.

The next Worship Committee meeting will be held at 6:30 P.M. on September 14th. The meeting closed with prayer and a pleasant social.
