"To what can I compare the Kingdom of God or what parable can we use for it? It is like a mustard seed that, when it is sown on the ground, is the smallest of all seeds on the earth. But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches, so that the bird of the sky can dwell in its shade."

- Gospel of St. Mark

Happy Ordinary Time! I should not say this, but I think I am war-weary of all of these feasts and celebrations, as nice as they all are. It is like having had a good Christmas celebration with family and friends, but grateful when



the "green" Christmas tree is finally taken down.

The gospel from St. Mark is certainly a reminder to me of many "ordinary days" when I was growing up on the farm. By the 4th of July we were already starting to walk the soybean fields (before all of the high-tech herbicides) and do the back-breaking work of hoeing weeds in the heat of the day.

While, for the most part, those six weeks of walking were pretty "ordinary" and sometimes not all that fun, there were from time to time some "extraordinary moments", like when we found sea shells in what had once been a swamp or slough (excuse me, I should say WETLAND)! There was another time that we found a grinding stone from the Native Americans. We had good intention of saving it and giving it to the Murray County Historical Society that was on the fair grounds. However, when the Fair came around in August, no one remembered where we had laid the stone. Equally, there were times when we saw all sorts of wildlife from deer to mice to even a fox or two.

But whenever I hear this gospel from St. Mark, I recall the summer when I was in grade school and we were all in a sea of yellow. For, from one end of the field to the other, all we had was wild mustard. The Good News is that you could see exactly where you had "cleaned the beans" as we called it. For one side looked green and the other side looked very yellow.

Being the youngest, I was usually behind my older siblings, but on that particular day I came across such a large mustard plant, the size of a small bush. I concluded (even before I tried) that I could not pull it out. As I was ready to take my hoe to it, I could not believe what I saw. In this large mustard plant's branches was a little nest with three bright eggs from one of the wild birds of the prairie.

In our hearts, all of the van de Crommerts are naturalists and we struggled as to what we should do. If we did not pull up the plant it would send thousands of more new weeds across the field. Disturb the plant and we would destroy the

nest. After much debate we carefully took the nest and set it near-by, under a row of beans that had been cleaned. We hoped and prayed that the parent-bird would find her eggs.

So what the Lord states in the gospel about the little seed becoming a great plant was lived reality for me. It is an image that, decades later, is still burned in my mind as we often tried to open the ripe pods of the wild mustard and find the tiniest of black seeds!

The Good News in all of this is that there is STRENGTH in SMALLNESS! I know, we live in a world where "bigger is better", the "majority rules", and "big-box stores" are better for consumers in selection and cost than the small town shop.

But, spiritually speaking, think how powerful one person can be for doing good! Look at the life of many of the saints and holy ones from Blessed Mother Theresa to St. Pope John Paul II. Imagine, if everyone in church would just invite one other person to come to Mass next Sunday, we would have standing room only!

Finally, let us not forget that each week when we come to celebrate the Holy Eucharist, the amount of Eucharist that we consume is so incredibly "small". The host is smaller than most chips or crackers and the sip of wine, barely wets our lips. Yet, we believe that small amount of Holy Communion allows Christ, that single soul (yet the Son of God), to come into our hearts and give us the spiritual power to make a GREAT difference in our lives and in the lives of others.

In the week ahead just try to do just a LITTLE act of kindness at home, work or at play. You might be amazed at the great spiritual outcome. Have a great week of summer! (Oh, yeah....I was serious about inviting someone else to Mass. Tell your neighbors and friends the Good News of Holy Rosary!) Blessings!!!!



PART-TIME PASTORAL SERVICE

Several months ago, I asked Lorraine Klaseus if she would be willing to help me as pastor, to identify and keep track of the many sick and home-bound that are in our parish. Having worked for 11 pastors, Lorraine knows many, if not most of the people from the parish. She has typed out a list for me to visit on a weekly basis and has recorded when I visited them, anointed them and gave them Holy Communion.

When I asked Lorraine to do this work, she told me that I was thinking like Fr. Ed, as she had handled the recording of his sick calls as well when he served as pastor. She recently informed me that, over the past nine months, more than a 100 home visits have occurred by the priest (not including our E.M.E. visits) and including some that had somehow slipped through the cracks (because we are a large parish) and did not have regular visits. (These people are now being assigned an E.M.E. to visit them weekly as well.) These visits do not include the weekly visits that Sr. Mary Anne and I had made to the hospital each week.

At a recent luncheon meeting, it was decided that both Deacon Russ and Lorraine will be visiting the hospital weekly. Deacon Russ will also be assisting in visiting some of the many sick and homebound in the months ahead. I am grateful for his ordained service!

Pastorally, I try to block a good part of many of my Fridays to visit the sick. I have always enjoyed the pastoral work of visiting and being with the aged, sick, injured and homebound. As I get more and more settled, I hope to do even more home visitation. My hope in the coming weeks is to again re-establish the Social Concerns committee that Fr. Ed had meeting with regularity throughout the year to address the needs of the infirm among other social concerns of our parish and broader community.

SUMMER REPAIRS

Recently, in consultation with the trustees, it was decided to complete the tuck-pointing work on the rectory by removing the mortar from the



brick. In addition, it was strongly recommended that we would address the limestone that is the trim on our 1950's church. Limestone is a porous rock and takes on moisture readily when it is not sealed. When the windows were removed from the church with their wooden frames and replaced with steel framed windows and stained glass, it was noted that the wooden window frames had rotted and deteriorated. This is the result of the limestone taking on moisture and sending it into the wooden frames.

The limestone was cleaned with an acid and water wash and then has been sealed. The above picture gives you an idea of how bad a shape the stone was in. The limestone was allowing water into the church structure and that is why you see the discoloration on the interior stone. It is also why we were having moisture problems in the church in the recent years. Every five years or so this stone needs to be re-sealed.

The front entrance of the church looks incredibly clean and beautiful again. I hope you take a moment to look at it. We have a beautiful church, but it takes work to maintain it. One of the members of my Maintenance Committee from a previous assignment use to say; "Anyone can build a building. It takes someone special to maintain it."
